Re: Urgent Request for Evaluation of the Mary Help of Christians Church, Rectory and School, 436 and 440 East 12th Street, 433 East 11th Street, Manhattan

Dear Chair Tierney:

We request that the Landmarks Preservation Commission consider for landmark designation the Roman Catholic Church of Mary Help of Christians, Rectory, and the Mary Help of Christians Parochial School at 436 East 12th Street, 440 East 12th Street and 433 East 11th Street, respectively. According to research conducted by the Greenwich Village Society for Historic Preservation, the Rectory dates from the 1850's and is among the earliest buildings on this block, the Church and the School buildings constructed on the site of the former Eleventh Street Catholic Cemetery, are the only structures to be built on this lot. The Church, completed in 1917, and the later School building are architecturally distinct and also very much intact, retaining important defining features. The buildings are also key elements of the narrative of the Italian immigrant experience in the East Village.

Since its founding, the Church of Mary Help of Christians was administered by the Salesians of St. John Bosco, a religious order that was founded in 1859 to care for the children of the working poor in Italy. The Salesians came to the United States in 1898 and established a community ministry for Italians on East 12th Street. The Order ministered from a variety of buildings on East 12th Street until the land for the former Eleventh Street Cemetery became available in the early 1900's. Naming the parish in honor of the Virgin Mary, the patron of the Order, the Salesians constructed a lower church, designed by Domenico Briganti in 1911, until funds could be raised for a full church building.

By 1916 the construction of the upper church had begun, an inspirational Italian Renaissance Revival style edifice designed by Nicholas Serracino. Serracino, an architect trained in Naples who emigrated to America in 1906, was the architect of choice of the Catholic Archdiocese of New York at the time, lending his skilled hand to a number of church buildings, including the elaborate Baroque style Church

of St. Jean Baptiste at 184 East 76th Street (individual New York City landmark - 1969), the diminutive, Baroque style Church of St. Clare formerly at 436 West 36th Street (demolished), and the Renaissance Revival Chapel of Sacred Heart of Jesus and Mary at 307 East 33rd Street, also demolished. Many of Serracino's buildings showcased his unique flair for translating the language of historic Italian architecture into the density and scale of the built environment of New York City. Though few of his churches are extant, those that do remain, like the Church of Mary Help of Christians, display Serracino's mastery of ecclesiastical architecture.

Serracino based his design for the Church of Mary Help of Christians, dedicated in 1917, on the Basilica of Mary Help of Christians in Turin, Italy. He deftly borrowed from that building's defining features, including its pedimented façade, Corinthian columns, central wheel window and flanking, and copper domed bell towers, transposing them for this far less monumental site on East 12th Street. Costing \$80,000 to build, the Church of Mary Help of Christians is a symmetrical composition with a painted brick façade, defined by its ornamented copper pediment with a simple entablature on Corinthian pilasters over a tri-partite door arrangement. Like the Basilica in Turin, there is also a single and simple wheel window. Flanking bell towers with copper domes add verticality to the structure.

More than merely copying from the Basilica, Serracino understood its architectural language. With the Church of Mary Help of Christians, Serracino managed to not only thoughtfully recreate elements of the Basilica in Turin, but also to create a structure that adds both gravitas and lightness to the streetscape on its own terms. Within the context of the East Village the building is truly unique.

As the parish community grew, the construction of a parochial school at 433 East 11th Street, directly behind the church, was begun. Completed in 1925, the Mary Help of Christians School was designed in the Neo-Renaissance style by architects Salvati & LeQuornik, who specialized in the design of Catholic rectories, parish halls, and schools. Salvati & LeQuornik were also noted for designing the 1924-25 addition to the Hubbard House at 2134 McDonald Avenue in Brooklyn, an individual New York City landmark (2009). The five-story Mary Help of Christians School has restrained Italianate ornament, including limestone pedimented window and arched door surrounds. Of particular note is the sculptural niche with a statue of the Virgin Mary, and the stepped, limestone trimmed parapet.

The Greek Revival style tenement at 440 East 12th Street was likely constructed in the 1850's, as reflected by historic maps. The building was purchased by the Church in 1925 to be converted into its rectory. Though modified by the Church at this time the building retains much if not all of its integrity, including its dentillated wood cornice.

The church and its buildings were in some ways the heart of the Italian community that developed in this part of the East Village. Generations of Italian families attended services, were baptized, educated, married and had funeral services in the buildings of Mary Help of Christians. Thousands of its parishioners would crowd East 12th Street in celebration of the Feast Day of Mary Help of Christians in May. Records indicate that Dorothy Day, founder of the Catholic Worker movement, worshipped here as she found that it was "indeed what a church should be, the center of the community." As further evidence of the lasting meaning of the parish and its service to the community, the corner of East 12th

Street and Avenue A was renamed in honor of Father Virginio Mancini (1895-1988) a parish priest from 1949 until 1986.

Representing an important era in the history of the Italian immigrant community in the East Village, as well as the Roman Catholic Church in New York, these buildings are architecturally, culturally and socially significant. In the East Village, where Catholic churches have been demolished or replaced with architecturally bland buildings, the very much intact Church of Mary Help of Christians, Rectory and its School are rare structures from a very special time in the history of the community. They add a commanding presence to the area's streetscape that should not be lost to demolition or inappropriate alteration. We are concerned by the threat posed by the pending sale of the buildings and ask that the LPC move quickly to prevent the loss or damage to these invaluable historic buildings.

We have attached relevant photos and primary source documents from the Greenwich Village Society for Historic Preservation's research. We look forward to your response.



HISTORY OF OUR PARISH

BEGININGS

1898 marks the beginning of our parish and the beginning of the Salesian work in the Eastern United States.

Three Salesians, Fr. Ernesto Coppo, pastor and director, Fr. Marcellino Scagliola and Conductor Bro. Faustino Squassone made up the first Salesian community. They arrived in New York harbor on November 28th 1898, the day before Thanksgiving. Archbishop Corrigan of New York had called the Salesians to his diocese and Msgr. G. Edwards, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church on East 14th Street, welcomed the Salesians in the name of the Archbishop. Aided by Msgr. Edwards the first Salesian community settled in the first floor and basement of 315 East 12th St. On December 8th 1898 the Salesians celebrated the Mass of the Immaculate Conception in their new house. Immediately they began their efforts to get in contact with the members of the Italian community of the area. Msgr. McSweeney, pastor of St. Brigid's on East 8th St. offered the use of the basement of his church for services in Italian.

Christmas 1898 was to be the grand opening of the basement-church of the Italians. The conferees had visited homes and distributed numerous leaflets announcing the coming event. Their expectations were high. "Our great concern was that the basement could only hold 800 people", wrote Fr. Coppo years

later. On Christmas day only 12 people showed up. "It is said that twelve Apostles initiated the Universal Church...", comments the chronicler, philosophically. Daily mass was scheduled for 10:00 AM. On January 29th 1899 Feast of St. Francis de Sales, the first baby was baptized. Her name was Concetta Sterace of 404 E. 11th St.

In March of the same year the first mission was preached and on Easter Sunday 600 people attended the Mass.

In May, "Month of Mary" devotions were introduced "with consoling results", writes the chronicler. On that same month the Society of Mary Help of Christians was founded.

Fr. Paolino Sapienza was accepted as an aspirant in June of 1899, the first U. S. candidate for membership in the Salesian Con-

gregation. On New Year's Day 1900 things looked more promising by far, than the previous year when only seven people had come to the Italian services.

Two English speaking confreres were added to the community at the beginning of 1900. They were Fr. Vincent Bertolino and Clerical Brother John Ferrazza.

The building on 341 East 12th St. was rented as a "Club room" for the society of the "Luigini" and for CCD classes. And still in the year 1900 an Italian journal was initiated: "L'Unione Italo-Americana" later to be fused with the publication "L'Italiano in America". The year closes with the arrival from Mexico of Fr. Joseph Villani who was appointed Prefect of the community.

Move to Transfiguration Church.

In May 1902 the Salesians left their living quarters on 315 E. 12th St. and moved to 29 Mott St. to take care of Transfiguration Church, an old Lutheran Church later sold to the Episcopalians and acquired by the Roman Catholics in 1870. In 1902 Fr. Coppo obtained the Church and with it a \$50,000 debt. The basement church at St. Brigid's was entrusted to the care of a secular priest, Fr. Mauro Michelangelo who on Sundays received help from one of the priests from Transfiguration Church.

The Italian people of East 12th Street area were not agreeable to this arrangement and in 1903 presented a petition for the return of the Salesians to Rev. Paul Albera who visited the U. S. on that year. Two other important events took place in 1903. On June 6th. deacon Ferrazza was ordained a priest by Bishop Farley and in August the Salesians opened their first school in the US in Troy, N. Y.

RETURN TO EAST 12th ST.

As had been promised by Fr. Albera, the Salesians returned to East 12th St. in February of 1904. This time they were ready to settle down and build up a church. With this purpose in mind they acquired the building on 431 E. 12th St. The operation was carried out in May-June 1905 and it involved

an expense of \$23,250. It can be safely stated that this was the beginning of the financial strains that have characterized the development of our parish to this day. The next step was a year later to acquire a new building, 429 East 12th St., at an added "strain" of \$25,500.

THE FIRST CHAPEL OF MARY HELP OF CHRISTIANS

There was enough building space now for living quarters and for a chapel. The ground floor of building 431 E. 12th St. served as a chapel. There is a note of optimism and joy reflected in the chronicle: "Good-bye St. Brigid's besement!.. we converted the old house number 431 into a chapel. In July the altar area was built and we set up an altar table given to us by Transfiguration Church. Later we decorated it, put in a new floor, the communion railing, a tabernacle, 24 benches and 3 confessionals. Finally we put in the poor box and our first chapel was finished!" Msgr. Edwards blessed the chapel of Mary Help of Christians on Sept. 16, 1906.

Reorientation trials and tribulations marked the period of growth and development from 1907-1910. In July 1907 a fire broke out in the ground floor of building 429 E. 12th St., (20 worth of damage of which \$15.00 were reimbursed): extortionary letters were received; (the police was notified. Fortunately nothing happened) there was another fire and there was also a bomb explosion in a building next to the residence of the Salesians 429 E. 12th St. (The apparent motive for this dramatic event was the wish that one of the members of the Salesian community should leave the area.) "The devil was at work; a good sign!" comments the chronicler.

PLANS FOR A CHURCH BUILDING.

At the same time, religious services, baptisms, confirmations and marriages were on the increase and the possibility of acquiring lots of land from a cemetery located in front of the chapel building, on the south side of

the street, was becoming a necessity. Plans for such a building operation began to crystallize late in 1908 when it was learned that 5 lots would be made available by the Diocese for the building of the church.

The last entry for 1908 has a somber ring: "The financial crisis, regrettably, tayed with us all year long!"

The perspective of building a new church gave impetus to a social service much needed in the community, a Day Care Center. It was decided that the upper section of the building 431 E. 12th St. would be used as a Day Nursery. In March of 1909 the Nursery was opened to the public. Otherwise all the energies of the Salesians and the people were directed to the construction of the church. On Feb. 1911 it was learned that Archbishop Farley had ceded five lots of the old cemetery area for the building of the church of Mary Help of Christians. In March 1911 Mons. Edwards blessed the corner stone of the church basement.

The construction of the basement was completed by the fall of that same year and in Sept. 24, 1911 it was solemnly blessed and dedicated.

Construction of the Upper Church.

Services were held in the basement church from 1911 to 1917. A choir loft was added and these years were particularly active for the Church of Mary Help of Christians. More than one thousand baptisms and about 500 marriages were being recorded annually during this period. In 1914 more than one thousand children attended CCD classes. The Archdiocese encouraged the updating of the Day Care Center. In response to the diocesan wishes the Salesians did their utmost to bring an Order of Sisters to staff the Center. In 1916 the "Mission Helpers" came to E. 12th Street. They took care of a renovated Day Care Center located in the 429-431 buildings. In January 1917 permission to build the upper church was obtained and in June 1917 construction began. The church was completed and dedicated on February 10th 1918. A major milestone had been reached. The Italian community had build its own church. Much work and many expenses were still ahead (main altar, picture of Mary Help of Christians, church bells, — at the dedication of these, Hon. LaGuardia was one of the speakers —, church decoration). Efforts and sacrifices were not spared and financial strains were ever present. The Day Care Center functioned officiently and satisfied a main need of the community. Again it had to be updated and made "fire proof". On Sept. 26 1920 Mons. Lavalie blessed the renovated Center.

A census taken in September 1923 indicated that only 5% of the Catholics living within the parish area attended Church. Great ignorance and religious indifference were given as reasons for such poor showing. That same year marks the acquisition of the 440 East 12th St. building which has served since then as the parish rectory.

Construction of the School.


In an effort to respond to the educational needs of the people in this area and counting on the zeal of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians the parish embarked on a meyor project, the construction of a parochial school. 1925 saw the beginnig of the construction effort and found the Church deep in dept. The buildings housing the Day Care Center were sold to the "Mission Heipers" (Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart), to cope up with the financial strains.

The Daughters of Mary Help of Christians arrived in our parish in 1926. In April a house was bought on 502 East 11th Street. They moved into this house in October 1926 and left that residence in 1949.

On May 9, 1926 Cardinal Hayes blessed the new School. In the fall of 1926 the first school year at Mary Help of Christians School began.


The Church debt for 1926 is given by the chronicler at \$110,000. A census conducted in connection with the Catholic Charities Campaign of that year indicated that there were about 3,700 adults and 1,500 children inscribed in our parish.

The Salesians also dedicated much of their attention to the youth of the area. Their efforts were courageous and untiring; the results alas, were meager. In July 1935 the building on 519 East 13th Street became




440 East 12th Street

the property of the Church and the "Don Bosco Community House" was opened. Staffed by lay people and by the priests of the parish, the community house was opened to the boys and girls of the area. This project was short lived but in 1939 and through the efforts of Miss Margaret McCare the project was restarted. This time the community house moved to 413 East 12th St.

Five rooms were used. It was open to Boys on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays and to girls on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Msgr. Lavallo came to bless the new project in July 1939. Fr. Pellegrino recalls how difficult it was to make a go of it. Acts of vandalism against the building and the furniture eventually advised the closing of the project.

A Period of Evolution and Transformation.

Through the 30's and the 40's the Church of Mary Help of Christians continued her services to the community but the signs of change and transformation were all too clear. There were an average 550 baptisms per year between 1920 and 1929. The average for the next decade 1930-1939 was 279 baptisms per year. For the decade 1940-1949 the average was 149 baptism per year.

There was an obvious exodus of Italian families reflected in those figures. During this period the Manhattan Lower East Side was being subjected to one of its many processes of transformation. This time it was the Italians who were moving up. Physical changes in the area also account for the exodus and transformation. The building of Stuyvesant town and P. S. 19 are two good examples. Those projects caused the relocations of many Italian families. Through all of those changes the Church of Mary Help of Christians continued her presence of service. The chronicle diligently kept year after

year, reflects the steady work of the priests and sisters, the religious societies, the Parochial School, the Day Care Center, and of course, it also reflects the financial strains of the parish.

In 1949 the Day Care Center was discontinued partly because this need was being filled by the City. From 1950-1959 an average of 133 baptisms per year were recorded. This figure doesn't indicate a radical change in the parish. Yet in the early 50's and through the cooperation of the Knights of Columbus, Bingo in a grand style was introduced. This activity reversed a continued tradition of financial strain. Debt were cancelled, improvements were introduced both in the parish and in the school. It is said that the parish was able to help the development of other work of the Salesian Eastern Province.

The Appearance of the Spanish Community.

The parish records show a sprinkling of Spanish names around the mid 60's. Between 1960 and 1969 there were an average 77 baptisms per year. More than 90% of the baptisms recorded in 1973 are Spanish surnamed. This change in the composition of our community has been recognized by Mary Help of Christians who is trying to respond to the new needs without forgetting her traditional commitments.

The service for youth is well represented by our school by our Savio club, Savio camp projects, and by our Boys Scout Troup.

Conclusion.

75 years after its foundation the Church of Mary Help of Christians is still committed to the service of the community, not only in the religious-sacrament area but in the educational and social areas as well. This pledge of service is well backed by the tradition of service and dedication established by the priests, sisters and lay people of the parish who served before us and whose work these pages record.
