

# Approved for Construction within the Greenwich Village Historic District Since Designation



#### Introduction

This report catalogues new buildings approved by the New York City Landmarks Preservation Commission (LPC) within the Greenwich Village Historic District since its designation in 1969. Not all of the buildings were constructed. Included in this report are a map of the sites and a timeline of the approvals. Additionally for each building there are links to permits or other records where available and information pertinent to the applications.

Somewhat surprisingly, neither the LPC nor the city's Department of Buildings has a record of all new buildings approved within the Greenwich Village Historic District. In many cases, the LPC does not even have a complete record of approvals granted for sites within historic districts.

Given the increasing number of applications for new buildings within our designated historic district, Village Preservation felt it was critical to compile a comprehensive catalogue of all such approvals, to see when, where, and for what they were granted – whether we agreed with, disagreed with, or were ambivalent about those approvals. As we continue to work to preserve and protect the special architectural and cultural heritage of Greenwich Village, the East Village, and NoHo, such information will be invaluable in informing our efforts and educating the public.

Research in this report was based on Village Preservation records, as well as those from the Department of Buildings and LPC. In many instances, records could not be located and in those cases, estimates were made for year of approval.

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
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
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
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
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


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## Map of New Buildings 1969–2021



since designation of the Greenwich Village Historic District by the Landmarks Preservation Commission in April 1969



#### St. John's in the Village Church 1972

224 West 11th Street (at Waverly Place)

In 1971 a fire destroyed the classical revival church that used to occupy this site and housed St. John's in the Village. It was replaced in 1974 by the current building designed by Edgar Tafel, a colleague of Frank Lloyd Wright.








at West 13th Street

Based on historic maps, as well as demolition and new building permits on file at the DOB, this gas station structure appears to be a new building, constructed after the designation of the district.







#### 18 West 11th Street 1977

between 5th and 6th Avenues

Also known as the Weathermen House, this new structure was designed by the firm of Hardy Holzman Pfeiffer. It replaced a Greek Revival townhouse destroyed in 1970 by an explosion in the basement from a bomb-making lab by the radical, antigovernment group the Weathermen.






#### 76 Greenwich Avenue

at West 13th Street

Based on DOB permits, it seems that this building was approved ca. 1979 by the LPC and was designed by Ferrenz & Taylor. In 2013, the LPC approved full demolition of the building at this site and approved plans for a park and AIDS memorial to take its place (see page 41).



#### 328 West 11th Street 1980

between Greenwich and Washington Streets

There are no permits online with the Department of Buildings nor on file with the Landmarks Preservation Commission. Evidence is inconclusive as to whether this is a new building or one that was altered, but the differences between the façade described in the 1969 designation report for the Greenwich Village Historic District and the current façade would indicate that at least the current façade dates to the postdesignation period.





#### 1980 1 7th Avenue

This was the St. Vincent's Hospital Coleman Building, designed by Ferrenz & Taylor. It was approved for demolition in 2013 as part of the Rudin residential redevelopment of the former hospital site (see page 39 for the new building approved here). between West 11th and 12th Streets









Although LPC permits could not be located, DOB permits indicate an approval date of circa 1983 by the LPC for this four-story commercial/residential structure designed by Smith & Thompson.



### 126 Waverly Pl/89 Washington Pl

at 6th Avenue

DOB records include a new building permit from 1984. This residential building with retail spaces on the ground floor was designed by Polshek Partnership, and covers the entire eastern side of 6th Avenue between Waverly Place and Washington Place.







#### 687 Greenwich Street 1986

aka Greenwich Mews

Built in 1986, these town houses were built as a residential enclave or mews on Greenwich Street south of West 10th Street, replacing a garage.





#### 513 Hudson St/248 West 10th St

at West 10th Street

DOB records include a new building permit from 1978 that was amended in 1987 as well as a demolition permit from 1987. The LPC file for this address did include a copy of the final approval but correspondence indicates that the proposal was revised and pending approval by the LPC as of October 1986. Renderings in the LPC file match the building that is seen today. It was designed by Norval White







#### 153 West 11th Street 1987

aka 1 7th Avenue

This is the St. Vincent's Hospital Link Building designed by Ferrenz & Taylor. It was approved for demolition in 2013 as part of the Rudin residential redevelopment of the former hospital site (see page 39 for the new building approved here).



### 22 Perry Street 1988

aka 167 Seventh Avenue South

DOB records include a 1983 new building permit as well as a 1988 demolition permit. No permits were found at LPC. This is sometimes referred to as the "Witch's Hat" building, and was designed by Architects Design Group.






#### 1990 115-125 7th Avenue South 2010

Designed by Gruzen Partnership, 115-125 7th Avenue South was approved by LPC c.1990 and constructed between 1990 and 1994. In 2008 alteration permits were filed with DOB for enlargement of the structure. In 2010 the enlargement was approved by LPC but to date, has not been constructed. The left image is the current building approved in 1990. The image on the right is a rendering of the structure approved by LPC in 2010.



This six-story residential structure with ground floor retail was designed by Kossar & Gary Architects, and replaced a taxi garage.






#### 97 Greenwich Avenue

at Horatio Street


New building approval from LPC for this four-story residential and commercial structure, designed by Alexander Compagno, was received by the DOB in 2001.






A 2002 demolition permit and post approval new building amendments from 2001 are on file with DOB for this five-story residential structure.



# 11 Christopher Street LPC OK circa 2002

between Greenwich Avenue and Waverly Place

This four-story residential structure with ground-floor retail was completed in 2006 and designed by Richard Cook of Cook+Fox Architects. This structure adjoins a restored historic building at 134 West 10th Street.







24 New Buildings in the

#### 829 Greenwich Street

Technically this is an alteration of an existing one-story building, but for all intents and purposes, this four-story single-family home is a new building. The structure occupies the northernmost site on Greenwich Street in the Greenwich Village Historic District, and was designed by Matthew Baird.



between Perry and West 11th Streets


The DOB received Landmarks approval for the construction of this new four-story residential structure with a courtyard in 2004, designed by the BM Design Group.






at 6th Avenue

While this was technically permitted as an alteration, no trace of the pre-existing two-story commercial building remains on the exterior, and thus for all intents and purposes this six-story mixed-use building is a new building. It was designed by SLCE Architects.





#### 293 West 4th Street 2005

The three new row houses at 293, 295 and 297 West 4th Street were approved in 2005. All were designed by Ernst & Associates Architects.






#### 295 West 4th Street

#### 122 Greenwich Avenue

at West 13th Street

Landmarks approval was received by DOB in 2007 for this 13-story, curving glass residential structure with ground-floor retail uses. It is located on the northernmost lot in the Greenwich Village Historic District on the site of a parking lot and was designed by Kohn Pedersen Fox Architects.

#### 501 Hudson Street 2008

aka 131 Christopher Street

The image on the left depicts the proposed new building for this site approved by LPC in 2008 (minus the penthouse). In 2014 a letter was issued by the LPC for extension of the new building permit. To date, the new building has not been constructed and the image on the right shows the site today.





### 703-711 Washington Street

LPC approved this proposal in 2008 for a seven-story-plus penthouse hotel designed by Morris Adjmi Architects. It was not constructed, and two subsequent applications were approved in 2009 (see page 34) and in 2017 (see page 46). aka 145-149 Perry Street



## 703-711 Washington Street 2009

aka 145-149 Perry Street

LPC approved this proposal for a six story, multi-family residential structure and two five-story town houses in 2009. They were designed by Helpern Architects. The structures were never built, and a new application was approved in 2017 for two new structures on the site (see page 46).

#### 335 West 12th Street

Approved by LPC in 2009, this single family home was designed by Selldorf Architects.


#### 20 7th Avenue LPC OK 2009

#### between West 12th and 13th Streets

This was an unusual case in which LPC approved this new hospital building for St. Vincent's (shown here in two views) through a hardship process rather than through a certificate of appropriateness process. Ultimately, however, this building, designed by Pei Cobb & Fried was never constructed, and the existing building on the site, the Joseph Curren Building which dates to 1963, has been restored.

# 487 Hudson Street

Part of St. Luke's school, this was an addition designed by Barry Rice Architects and approved by LPC in 2012. It was an addition to a building designed by Thomas M. Bell and built in the early 1950s with an adjacent playground.



## 133-141 West 11th Street LPC OK 2013

between 6th and 7th Avenues

This row of new town houses (rendering shown here) was built in 2016 and designed by the firm of FX Fowle. This row replaced the Cronin Building, built in 1961 and designed by Eggers and Higgins.

The image is a rendering of the approved building in 2013 at this site, designed by FX Fowle. It replaced the St. Vincent's Hospital Coleman & Link Buildings, built 1984–87 and designed by Ferrenz & Taylor (see pages 11 and 16).





The approved building designed by FX Fowle, rendering shown here, was not built, but was to replace the Reiss Building built in 1955 and designed by Eggers and Higgins. LPC later approved a plan to preserve and rehabilitate the Reiss building.

In 2013, LPC approved full demolition of the building at this site (see page 9) and approved plans for a park and AIDS memorial. The park and memorial were recently completed and are illustrated below.

LPC approved plans for a new building, designed by Barry Rice, on this former parking lot in 2014, rendering illustrated here.






#### 327 Bleecker Street




# 703-711 Washington Street 2017






## 11-19 Jane Street

LPC approved plans for a condominium with six units designed by David Chipperfield at this location. Architect's renderings are shown here. between West 4th Street and Greenwich Avenue







LPC approved plans for a seven story residential and commercial structure designed by Morris Adjmi at this location. The architect's rendering is shown here.






# 38-42 West 8th Street

between West 8th and West 9th Streets


