Preserving Our Past, **SHAPING OUR FUTURE**

Founded in 1980, **Village Preservation** works to document, celebrate, and preserve the special architectural and cultural heritage of Greenwich Village, the East Village, and NoHo.

Village Preservation has successfully advocated for the landmark designation of more than 1,300 buildings in our neighborhoods, and has helped secure zoning protections for nearly 100 blocks. Our programs and educational resources reach more than a million people each year to highlight the rich and irreplaceable history of our neighborhoods.

The rally to preserve the Tony Dapolito Recreation Center was one of several advocacy efforts in our communities this year. Read more about our campaigns on page 3.



A Note from THE PRESIDENT

The past year offered many opportunities for us to look back on our past and think hard about our future. Perhaps no occasion did so more pointedly than the passing of Village Preservation's longtime trustee (1989–2024) and past President (1993–1999) Judith Stonehill.

Judith was an exemplar of what our neighborhoods are about — fiercely independent and yet deeply connected to her neighbors; passionately committed to history with one eye always on the future; appreciative of the wisdom in traditions, and yet preternaturally attuned to innovation. Judith's gifts to our neighborhoods and our organization are almost too great to count. She began our Annual House Tour Benefit, Annual Village Awards, Children's Education Program, and Oral History project. She created and edited our book, *Greenwich Village Stories*. Her early donation of rare historic images helped seed our Historic Image Archive, now consisting of over 70 collections and 5,000 images.

That's what Judith did — she began things which then blossomed. A long-time small-business owner (New York Bound Bookshop), she helped steer the organization toward its focus on supporting independent shops in our neighborhoods. She helped lead the organization's many critical campaigns to defend our


neighborhoods' architectural integrity, and was herself the longtime owner of 131 Charles Street, an 1834 house that was one of the first in the city to be landmarked.

We'll miss Judith's generosity, kindness, and wisdom. But we're so fortunate that she left us an invaluable legacy. The programs she began, and the efforts she helped launch will live on, and continue to yield abundant dividends for the communities and causes she loved.

Judith's deep commitment to preservation, along with her foresight and vision, will forever serve as a source of inspiration. Fortunately for Village Preservation, that commitment to bettering one's community and honoring its history is emblematic of what motivates so many of our members, and continues to propel us forward in our work every day.

Preservation and ADVOCACY



Advocating to protect the special historic character of Greenwich Village, the East Village, and NoHo is the heart of what we do. This meant taking on a variety of efforts over the past year locally, citywide, and statewide. They included:

- ▶ Finally securing landmark designation of **50 West 13th Street** after a four-year campaign. The endangered 1846 house served as the longtime home of the 13th Street Repertory Theatre and, as established by our research, the 19th-century home of noted Black abolitionists and civil rights leaders Jacob Day and Sarah Smith Tompkins Garnet. With this designation, we have secured landmark status for more than

- ▶ Fighting City plans to construct a **600-ft.-tall tower** of mostly super-luxury apartments on public land in the Meatpacking District ("Gansevoort Square").



- ▶ Demanding the City repair and reopen the beloved **Tony Dapollito Recreation Center** it's let rot for five years, and opposing the Mayor's plan to demolish it.

▶ Leading a campaign to landmark the endangered historic **New York Eye and Ear Infirmary** at Second Avenue and 13th Street, which would be our city's first and only landmark honoring the history of people with disabilities.

In addition, we issued three hard-hitting and impactful reports this past year, aimed at some of our most serious current and ongoing policy challenges. They showed:

Under Mayor Adams, new landmark designations have sunk to an all-time low in the 60-year history of the NYC Landmarks Preservation Commission, and the few taking place overwhelmingly eschew endangered sites in need of protections for sites not in danger and often where designation would have limited or no practical effect.

The approach City leaders have been promoting regarding expanding new housing development and stripping away neighborhood planning protections has a strong correlation with neighborhoods becoming less Black and Hispanic, and more white. But the reverse is true for neighborhoods with strong measures to guide and channel new development, such as those for which preservationists advocate.

The 2021 SoHo/NoHo rezoning has so far destroyed more affordable housing than it has created, new development has moved ahead under the rezoning with no affordable housing in spite of promises that it would, and projections about residential vs. commercial development that the rezoning would engender have been wildly inaccurate — exactly as we predicted.



PROGRAMS

In Our Communities


This past year we held 82 in-person and virtual events, almost all free and open to the public, on a wide array of topics highlighting the special history and character of Greenwich Village, the East Village, and NoHo, as well as historic preservation.

They ranged widely from forums on preservation issues with candidates for Mayor, Manhattan Borough President, and three local City Council seats, to programs on our new online resources such as our Fifth Avenue, French Flats, and Art Deco maps, as well as our new photo collections of the Greenwich Village waterfront. Other themes our programming highlighted this year included women artists, waterfront development, local LGBTQ+ history, neighborhood nightlife, and much more. We partnered with institutions as diverse as the New York Public Library, the Whitney


Museum of American Art, Hunter College, the Merchant's House Museum, the New York Studio School, and the Salmagundi Club for special insider tours of their exhibits and spaces.

We also unveiled two wonderful new plaques — one marking the home of labor trailblazer and first female U.S. cabinet secretary Frances Perkins, and the other honoring artist, arts patron, and Whitney Museum founder Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney on her 150th birthday, at her former 8th Street studio.











Fifth Avenue: 1824 to Today





Individual contributions from our members and the public remained our single largest source of support for Village Preservation. Foundations, government agencies and elected officials also remained a significant source of support, as did fundraising events and merchandise sales.

Our Greenwich Village Building Set made with genuine LEGO bricks designed by Peacham brought in \$35,447 in revenue over the last year, after bringing in \$75,936 the prior year, when it was launched. The first-of-its-kind offering has been a fun and engaging opportunity to celebrate the rich history of our neighborhoods and highlight landmarked sites including Jefferson Market Library, Washington Square Park, MacDougal Alley, Stonewall, and the old Village Cigars.

Public EDUCATION

Our programs aimed at teaching young students, adults, and real estate professionals about the value of preservation, and the public about the value of small businesses in our community, remain at the core of our work.



This past year our **Children's Education program** served 2,154 students in 82 classes at 20 schools in Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx. Using our neighborhoods as a living museum, the program teaches children about architectural, immigration, New York, Black, and Native American history. By far the majority were from high-needs schools that received the program for free or at reduced cost.



Our **Continuing Education program** served 55 adults last year, with our spring and fall three day courses looking at architectural history and development in our city. The program brings together experts in the fields of law, government, construction, zoning, and preservation.



Our **Business of the Month** and **Welcome to the Neighborhood programs** highlighted and supported more than a dozen legacy and new independent small businesses in our neighborhoods, including Casey Rubber Stamp, Garber Hardware, Downtown Burritos, Global Table, Travelers Poets & Friends, Dryden Gallery and Custom Framing, LifeThyme Natural Market, Cowgirl Hall of Fame, and Academy Records.




